Ter to the Mentor

We are so excited to have you on this journey with us–discipling girls into the women God has called them to be. These four lessons will allow girls to learn about Jesus' love and kindness and, from that understanding, begin to model His compassion in everything they do.

One important thing to remember is that these lessons are intended to be a *starting* place. We encourage you to view this resource as more of a "talking points guide," allowing you to connect with girls in a way where the *relationship* drives the *discipleship*, as opposed to the *curriculum* driving the *discipleship*. Effective discipleship isn't the result of a quality curriculum as much as it is about the intentionality of relationship. To help foster intentional relationship, there are three ways you can adapt the curriculum:

- 1. Adapt it to you. Be yourself as you teach. Adapt what is said in the lessons to fit your style and personality. This will help you and the lessons come across genuinely to the girls in your group.
- 2. Adapt it to <u>your girls</u>. Your girls may be more energetic and connect more with activities that get them up and moving. Or they may be more academic and enjoy reading Scripture and diving into deep discussion. Pay attention to the personalities and interests of the girls in your group and tailor the lessons to engage them where they're at.
- 3. Adapt it to your community. Depending on your setting and culture, elements in the lessons may need to be worded differently to make sense. Make these adjustments to allow girls to connect.

You are the mentor, and God has appointed you for this purpose. We want to empower you to take the lead as you facilitate this unit with your small group. You may choose to rearrange activities or skip some activities to make more room for others. You may decide to reword something in order to express it in a way that will make sense to your girls. Our hope is that this resource will equip you with the foundational elements you need while also empowering you to use it in a way that results in meaningful relational discipleship.

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BEFORE AND AFTER THE LESSON

INTENTIONAL WELCOME TIME (5 minutes)

Welcome each girl by name (show friendship and warmth). Greet families as they drop their girls off and thank them for coming to church. Share your excitement by saying something such as, "You could be anywhere, and you came here to church. Choosing to be in God's house is always a great choice." Ask the girl a relationship-building question. Some examples include:

- What was your high/low this week?
- Tell me about the best thing that happened this week!
- What was a challenge you've overcome?
- Was there anything cool you saw God do this week?

Take notes discreetly (or at the end of the small group time) about each girl and follow up in subsequent weeks to show them you care about what they care about.

ACTIVITY CENTERS (20-30 minutes)

As girls arrive, provide one center activity for every 4 or 5 girls: play dough, LEGO[®] bricks, Wikki Stix[®], connecting beads, a craft, board games, coloring, etc.

Intentionally make this a relational time. The goal is to build relationships with girls as they are engaged in an activity and with families as they drop their girls off.

CENTERS + CHECK OUT TIME (20-30 minutes)

As girls are being picked up, provide one center activity for every 4 or 5 girls: play dough, LEGO® bricks, Wikki Stix®, connecting beads, a craft, board games, coloring, etc.

Continue to intentionally make this a relational time. Be intentional with continuing conversations about the lesson and even working on Scripture memorization.

Notice each girl as she is leaving and use her name as you say goodbye. Invite her back next time. Be sure each girl knows you are looking forward to seeing her again soon!

AFTER THE LESSON

ENGAGE (5–10 minutes)

Play Musical Chairs



One chair less than the number of girls playing the game, music everyone can hear, **Key Truth/Scripture Poster**, 1 per girl



Print the **Key Truth/Scripture Poster**. *Place chairs in an outward-facing circle. Have upbeat worship music ready and be able to start/stop it easily.*

Girls will stand outside the circle of chairs. When the music starts, girls will begin walking clockwise around the circle of chairs. When the music stops, each girl will sit down in the closest chair. The girl left without a chair is out. One chair is removed, and the circle is now smaller. The music starts again and girls, once again, begin walking clockwise around the circle of chairs. Repeat this process until only one chair remains and the girl to be the first to sit when the music stops is the winner!



How did it feel when there weren't enough chairs for everyone?

What was going on in your mind when you were the one left without a chair?

To understand compassion, we first must know we are loved by God and He provides for us. This is our Key Truth! Let's say that together, "I am loved by God and He provides for me."





Hold up a sample and hand out a Key Truth/Scripture Poster to each girl.



In God's plan, there's always a seat for everyone. There will never be a time when God takes away our "seat." Instead, He always makes room for us and provides a place for us in His kingdom. When God loves us and provides for us, He is

- Print posters full size on a 8.5" x 11" sheet and girls can hang them in their rooms.
- Print all four lesson posters on one 8.5" x 11" sheet and cut them out. For each lesson, hand out the small poster and girls can glue them into a notebook or tuck them into their Bible.

showing us compassion. With God, there's never a shortage. He will always take care of us because we are loved by God and He provides for us. The verse we will be memorizing is **Psalm 145:8**, and it says:

The LORD is merciful and compassionate, slow to get angry and filled with unfailing love.

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EXPLORE (10–15 minutes)

Needs/Wants Sorting Activity



Sorting Cards (mixed up and put into bag/envelope) for each group, a flat surface such as a table or floor



Print and cut apart the cards. Mix them up. Place them in a bag or envelope.

Split into groups of 2 or 3 girls each. Give each group a bag with

sorting cards. Have girls take the cards out and place them face up on a flat surface. Invite the girls to read and sort the cards by placing all the cards with a need together and all the cards with a want together. Encourage the girls to read the card aloud and talk about the needs and wants as they sort them thinking about why each is a need or a want. When the girls are satisfied with how they sorted the cards, reveal the answers and ask the girls to compare their sort to the answer key.



After the sort, take turns reading each need/want and discussing why it's a need/want. This should be conversational, with the mentor sharing stories that connect where applicable and providing the girls a chance to share.

Example: "I wanted the style of shoes that all the other girls were getting because I wanted to fit in. My mom said I didn't need any new shoes right now, so I was disappointed and had a bad attitude. Now I realize that was a want, not a need."

Ask: When in your life did you really want something that maybe you didn't need? What did your parents tell you? How did that make you feel?

EXPLAIN (25–30 minutes)

Read the Bible Story (Luke 10:25–37)



Print the **Bible Story.**

Teaching Tip

Bible Story, 1 per girl, highlighters / pens / colored pencils

If someone forgot their Bible, have handouts of the Scripture passage ready. But encourage girls to remember to bring their Bibles every time. For girls who brought their Bibles, challenge them to find the verses on their own because this develops familiarity with the Bible and biblical literacy.

Bible Literacy Strategy

Read through the text with your group at least two times. On the first time through, read it like normal. Then, on the second read-through, model using highlighters / pens / colored pencils to mark things that stand out. Explain to girls that they could mark things they want to remember or put a question mark next to things that don't make sense. Show them how they can even write notes in the margins if the Lord puts something on their heart as they read. Let them know there's no right or wrong way to do this. What one girl chooses to highlight will probably be different from what another girl highlights. That's okay, and it's actually a good thing! As we mark the things that are meaningful to us and discuss them with others, someone may share something that maybe another person didn't even notice. This is one reason it's so great to read and discuss the Word in a group.

discuss

How did the priest and temple assistant treat the Jewish man?

How did the Samaritan act toward the Jewish man?



The priest and the temple assistant were both important people. People respected them and they were thought highly of. On the other hand, the Samaritans were hated people. Jews did not treat Samaritans very well. This story is so surprising because the people who had it all, the priest and temple assistant, refused to take a moment out of their day to stop and care for someone who was hurting. But the Samaritan, even though the injured Jew may have strongly disliked him, still chose to stop and care for him. The Samaritan had compassion! He noticed the needs of someone else and showed kindness by taking action to help.



Write on the board, "Compassion: caring about others and treating them with kindness." Keep this definition up or rewrite it each lesson throughout the unit.



At the end of this story, Jesus said, "Now go and do the same," referring to how the Samaritan showed compassion on the suffering Jewish man. How can you "go and do the same" by showing compassion to people in your life?



Something else that stands out in this story is the kindness of the Lord. The fact that someone completely unexpected stopped to care for a hurting man shows that God really loves His people and will provide for their needs.



Share an age-appropriate story about a time when God provided for you and you were reminded of how much He loves you. Invite girls to share their own stories too.

Introduce and Watch Video



TV or projector screen, Guatemala Lesson 1 Video

Have the video ready to play.

Helpful Info

The goal of the videos throughout this series is to help young girls gain a broader worldview. Many of them may have no idea what life looks like for people who live in different areas of the world. As they are exposed to the work God is doing through Convoy of Hope in Guatemala, we hope they will grow in their awareness and join in praying for people around the world.



We are going to watch a video with Shonna from Convoy of Hope and Nicole from National Girls Ministries. They will be talking about their experience with the Convoy of Hope team in Guatemala. Shonna and Nicole will tell us about a woman named Alicia who has learned how much God loves her and how He will provide for her needs. Let's watch and see how Convoy of Hope is being used to show compassion in Guatemala through the Women's Empowerment Program.



Watch the video. (2 minutes)



Our Key Truth this week is, "I am loved by God and He provides for me." What are some ways God provided for Alicia in the video from Guatemala?

What did you see or hear in the video that you most want to remember?

What are some ways God provides for you?

How has God shown you He loves you?

ELABORATE (10–15 minutes)

Journal Reflection + Discussion + Prayer

On your journal page, write about or draw something that will help you remember how much God loves you and how He has provided for you. For example, you may choose to write about having a safe home and comfortable bed to sleep in because this shows you that He cares for your safety and comfort. Then write a prayer to the Lord thanking Him for how much He loves you and asking Him for something you need. If you finish before the time ends, you may work on the coloring sheet.



Play some soft worship music. Give the girls 5–10 *minutes to reflect on their journal page.* **Tip**: The mentor should also be journaling alongside the girls . . . not as an enforcer, but modeling how to journal with a Bible, notebook, and pen.



After the time has passed, come back together as a group. Ask if anyone would like to share any thoughts that surfaced during the reflection time.

Ask if any girls have a prayer need they would like to share. Write down requests as they are shared.

Pray together as a group. The goal is for the mentor to model prayer and begin to empower each girl to take the lead with this prayer time.

EVALUATE (5 minutes)

Final Thoughts & Wrap Up



Let's say our Memory Verse, Psalm 145:8, together: "The LORD is merciful and compassionate, slow to get angry and filled with unfailing love."



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

AFTER THE LESSON

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ENGAGE (10–15 minutes)

Play I Spy (better for younger girls) or Signs (better for older girls)



Key Truth/Scripture Poster, 1 per girl



Print the Key Truth/Scripture Poster.

I Spy

Choose someone to be "it" (the spy). That person stands in front of the group and looks around the room to choose an object. Once they choose something, they say, "I spy with my little eye, something ____." Any identifier can be used such as: naming the color, texture, beginning with the letter __, etc. The spy then calls on girls one at a time to guess what the mystery object is. The girl who guesses correctly is the next spy.

Signs

The Goal: Pass the "sign" around the circle without being caught by the person in the middle. Think of the "sign" as an invisible ball. The way the sign is passed is by showing your sign to accept (once that has been done it's in that person's possession), then that person "passes it" by showing another person's sign. When the person with that sign accepts, now it's in their possession.

How to Play: Girls will sit in a circle, and each will choose a "sign." This is any little gesture they can make, such as thumbs up, brushing hair behind the ear, adjusting glasses, touching their knee, etc. After each girl has chosen a sign, go around and each girl will show their sign to the group. It's easier at the beginning to encourage girls to just remember two or three girls' signs. Once all signs have been shown, one girl will go into the middle of the circle. She will spin around with her eyes closed, counting to ten. While she's counting, the sign will start being "passed." After counting to ten, the girl in the middle opens her eyes and starts to look around the circle, with the goal of catching someone in the act of "holding the sign." The girl in the middle gets three guesses before she must close her eyes, count to ten, and spin around again. When the guesser catches the person with the sign, they switch spots and now that girl is in the middle.



How did using your eyes and paying close attention help you in this game?



Our Key Truth today is for you to seek to discover the needs of those around you. Let's say that together, "I will seek to discover the needs of those around me." We will continue practicing our Memory Verse, which is Psalm 145:8, "The LORD is merciful and compassionate, slow to get angry, and filled with unfailing love." Today we will also spend some time in **Matthew 22:37–39 (NIV)**, which says:

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Page 3

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Jesus replied, "'Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"



Hold up a sample and hand out a Key Truth/Scripture Poster to each girl.



Just like in the game we played, to show love and compassion toward others, we must pay close attention to those around us. We need to use our eyes and ears to notice if they are in need. This is what it means to seek to discover the needs of those around us. Just like how the Lord listens closely to us and understands our needs, it's important that we listen to others and ask questions to help us understand what they need. This is how we love our neighbor as ourselves.



EXPLORE (5–15 minutes)

Spot the Difference Activity

Spot the Difference Sheets, 1 per girl; pencils/markers/crayons



Print the Spot the Difference Sheets.



Soot the Difference

Girls will choose an activity sheet and something to write with. They may work with a partner or independently. The goal is to find and circle all the differences they see. If they find all of them, they can move to the other version of the activity sheet.



Come back together and discuss if girls were able to find all the differences. If someone still can't find them all, work together as a group to help everyone find the differences.



Sometimes other people can see things we may not notice. This is one reason why good friendships are important!

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EXPLAIN (25–30 minutes)

Read the Bible Story (Ruth 1:8–16)



Bible Story, 1 per girl; highlighters / pens / colored pencils

Print the Bible Story.

Bible Literacy Strategy

Read through the text with your group at least two times. On the first time through, read it like normal. Then, on the second read-through, model using highlighters / pens / colored pencils to mark things that stand out. How do you think Naomi felt in this moment—being in an unfamiliar place without her family?



In verse 6 it says that Naomi got word that the Lord had blessed her homeland with good crops again. She and her daughters-in-law decided to travel back home. This is where we will begin our reading.

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Ruth Stays with Naomi Ruth 1:8–16

8 But on the way, Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back to your mothers' homes. And may the LORD reward you for your kindness to your husbands and to me. 9 May the LORD bless you with the security of another marriage." Then she kissed them good-bye, and they all broke down and wept.

10 "No," they said. "We want to go with you to your people."

11 But Naomi replied, "Why should you go on with me? Can I still give birth to other sons who could grow up to be your husbands? 12 No, my daughters, return to your parents' homes, for I am too old to marry again. And even if it were possible, and I were to get married tonight and bear sons, then what? 13 Would you wait for them to grow up and refuse to marry someone else? No, of course not, my daughters! Things are far more bitter for me than for you, because the LORD himself has raised his fist against me."

14 And again they wept together, and Orpah kissed her mother-in-law good-bye. But Ruth clung tightly to Naomi. 15 "Look," Naomi said to her, "your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods. You should do the same."

16 But Ruth replied, "Don't ask me to leave you and turn back. Wherever you go, I will go; wherever you live, I will live. Your people will be my people, and your God will be my God."



At that time, widows faced many challenges. They were often not respected and were given few opportunities for work. Widows often lived poor and difficult lives. Naomi knew that if Orpah and Ruth stayed with her, they would remain as widows, living a difficult life. Naomi insisted that they go back to their homeland and remarry so they would have a chance at rebuilding their lives and experiencing happiness.



What did Ruth choose to do? Why do you think she did that?

If Ruth would've been focused on herself, do you think she would have acted that way?

Teaching Tip

Silence is okay! It's important to give girls adequate "think time" so they can be thoughtful in their contributions to the discussion.



Ruth noticed her mother-in-law was in need and even though Naomi told her to leave, Ruth chose to stay. She used her eyes, ears, and heart to discover the needs of someone else and that allowed her to show kindness and compassion.

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Have you ever noticed someone else was in need? How did you know they were in need?

Has there been a time when someone didn't tell you they were struggling, but you could just tell? What did you notice in the way they were acting that made you think that? Without saying the person's name, can anyone tell us about that moment?

(You may start by sharing a personal story of a time you noticed someone around you was in need.)

Introduce and Watch Video

Have the video ready to play.



Today we will hear from Shonna and Nicole again as they talk about how the Convoy of Hope Girls Empowerment Program in Guatemala is seeking to discover the needs of young girls and striving to meet those needs. Let's see how these girls are being encouraged to be all God has created them to be.



The goal of the videos throughout this series is to help young girls gain a broader worldview. Many of them may have no idea what life looks like for people who live in different areas of the world. As they are exposed to the work God is doing through Convoy of Hope in Guatemala, we hope they will grow in their awareness and join in praying for people around the world.



Watch the video. (3 minutes)



Our Key Truth today is, "I will seek to discover the needs of those around me." How are these girls being impacted as Convoy of Hope seeks to discover their needs?

What was something that stood out to you from the video?



One reason we want to make sure we are paying attention to the needs of those around us is because that's exactly what Jesus does for us! It says in Matthew 6:8 that our Father knows exactly what we need even before we ask Him! The Bible also says that God will take care of us (Psalm 55:22). By noticing the needs of others, we are representing God and showing compassion.



When has someone used their eyes/ears/heart to discover *your* needs? How did it make you feel that they were paying close attention to you and wanting to care for you?

How can you do that for other people?

(Ideas might include: asking people how they are doing and really listening to their answers, thinking about other people and what they are going through instead of just focusing on ourselves, paying attention to whether someone is acting differently and checking in on them, etc.)

ELABORATE (10–15 minutes)

Journal Reflection + Discussion + Prayer



Journaling Page, 1 per girl; Word Search, 1 per girl; pens/pencils

Print the **Journaling Page** and **Word Search** (front/back or as separate single-sided pages), have soft music ready to play.





Let's say our Key Truth together. "I will seek to discover the needs of those around me."

On your Journaling Page, write or draw about some things we can do to discover the needs of people around us.

Also write a prayer to the Lord thanking Him for always seeing you and knowing what you need. Ask Him to help you put others before yourself and notice their needs. If you finish before the time ends, you may work on the Word Search.



Play some soft worship music. Give the girls 5–10 minutes to reflect on their Journaling Page. **Tip**: The mentor should also be journaling alongside the girls . . . not as an enforcer, but modeling how to journal with a Bible, notebook, and pen.



After the time has passed, come back together as a group. Ask if anyone would like to share any thoughts that surfaced during their reflection time.

Ask if any girls have a prayer need they would like the group to pray over. Write down requests as they are shared.

Pray together as a group. The goal here is for the mentor to model prayer and begin to empower each girl to take the lead with this prayer time.

EVALUATE (5 minutes)

Final Thoughts & Wrap Up

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Materials needed

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BEFORE AND AFTER THE LESSON

INTENTIONAL WELCOME TIME (5 minutes)

Welcome each girl by name (show friendship and warmth). Greet families as they drop their girls off and thank them for coming to church. Share your excitement by saying something such as, "You could be anywhere, and you came here to church. Choosing to be in God's house is always a great choice." Ask the girl a relationship-building question. Some examples include:

- What was your high/low this week?
- Tell me about the best thing that happened this week!
- What was a challenge you've overcome?
- Was there anything cool you saw God do this week?

Take notes discreetly (or at the end of the small group time) about each girl and follow up in subsequent weeks to show them you care about what they care about.

ACTIVITY CENTERS (20-30 minutes)

As girls arrive, provide one center activity for every 4 or 5 girls: play dough, LEGO[®] bricks, Wikki Stix[®], connecting beads, a craft, board games, coloring, etc.

Intentionally make this a relational time. The goal is to build relationships with girls as they are engaged in an activity and with families as they drop their girls off.

CENTERS + CHECK OUT TIME (20-30 minutes)

As girls are being picked up, provide one center activity for every 4 or 5 girls: play dough, LEGO® bricks, Wikki Stix®, connecting beads, a craft, board games, coloring, etc.

Continue to intentionally make this a relational time. Be intentional with continuing conversations about the lesson and even working on Scripture memorization.

Notice each girl as she is leaving and use her name as you say goodbye. Invite her back next time. Be sure each girl knows you are looking forward to seeing her again soon!

AFTER THE LESSON

ENGAGE (5–10 minutes)

Play Kind Katrina Says ...



Key Truth/Scripture Poster, 1 per girl



Print the Key Truth/Scripture Poster.

This game is like Simon Says but focuses on identifying acts of kindness.

How to play:

"Kind Katrina" (should be the mentor the first round) will go to the front of the room. Kind Katrina will say, "Kind Katrina says ____," then name an action. If the action is kind, the girls will do the action. If it's not kind, they must stay perfectly still. Anybody who accidently moves (even a little flinch) on an unkind action is out and will sit down. The last girl standing is the winner and gets to be "Kind Katrina" the next round.

To be compassionate means we show kindness to others.

Our Key Truth today is, "I will show compassion by serving people around me." Let's say that together: "I will show compassion by serving people around me." Let's also say our Memory Verse, Psalm 145:8 together: "The LORD is merciful and compassionate, slow to get angry, and filled with unfailing love." Today's Key Truth ties in with 1 Peter 4:10 (ESV), which says,

As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace.

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
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Hold up a sample and hand out **Key Truth/Scripture Poster** to each girl.

What do you think it means to be a "good steward"?

A good steward is someone who does a good job of taking care of something that's been given to them. In *The Message* paraphrase, 1 Peter 4:10 (MSG) says, "Be generous with the different things God



gave you." When we are good stewards that means we use the gifts and talents God has given us to serve those around us. We should remember that everything we have is a blessing from God. Because the Lord has been so kind and generous to us, we are encouraged to live that way toward the people in our lives as well.

EXPLORE (15–20 minutes)

Make Compassion Coupon Books



Ten index cards per girl (8 cards will be for coupons, the other 2 will be the front and back cover of the booklet), hole punch, key rings / string / craft materials to decorate



Hole punch the top left corners of the cards, distribute writing supplies and any other craft materials that may be used to decorate.

Girls will create a coupon book with coupons focused on different ways they can serve others. When they see someone in need, they can hand them the coupon and serve the person in that way.



Today we will be making coupon books! Inside these books will be coupons with activities you could do to serve someone. Anytime you notice an opportunity to bless another person, you can choose a coupon, give it to the person, and do

Project Idea!

This activity could be turned into a unit-long "project." Consider sectioning it, so each time the group meets, girls can add a few more cards to their books. This would also be a good pre- or postlesson activity.

whatever the card says. For example, if you notice your mom and dad are having a hard day, you could give them a "I will wash the dishes" coupon and take care of the dishes so they don't have to worry about it.

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As a group, we will come up with a list of things you could do to serve others, but feel free to come up with your own ideas as well!



Instructions

- 1. Come up with a list of things you could do to serve others. Write the ideas on the board or a piece of chart paper.
- Distribute index cards so girls can begin creating their coupons. Encourage them to color and design each coupon as well. On the back of each card, they can write:

From: (<u>their name)</u>

- 3. Girls can also design the front and back covers of their books. Maybe the front cover will say, "A Compassion Coupon Book to remind me to look for ways to serve people around me!" Remind the girls to be creative and have fun with this!
- 4. Once coupons and covers have been completed, use the key ring or string to thread the cards together through the hole-punched hole in the corner.
- 5. Encourage the girls to carry their books with them and always be looking for ways they can serve others. When they see someone in need, they choose a coupon and serve the person in that way.

Remind girls to always have parental supervision when doing something for someone else, especially someone they may not know well.

Coupon Book Ideas



Serving people doesn't have to be a huge activity that takes a lot of time and energy. We can serve people in small-but-meaningful ways every day. By carrying around these coupon books, I hope you notice ways you can serve others and choose to make time to do that.

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EXPLAIN (25–30 minutes)

Read the Bible Story (2 Corinthians 9:6–15)



Bible Story, 1 per girl; highlighters / pens / colored pencils

Print the **Bible Story**.

Bible Literacy Strategy

Read through the text with your group at least two times. On the first time through, read it like normal. Then, on the second read-through, model using highlighters / pens / colored pencils to mark things that stand out. Explain to girls that they could mark things they want to remember or put a question mark next to things that don't make sense. Show them how they can even write notes in the margins if the Lord puts something on their heart as they read. Let them know there's no right or wrong way to do this. What one girl chooses to highlight will probably be different from what another girl highlights. That's okay, and it's actually a good thing! As we mark the things that are meaningful to us and discuss it with others, someone may share something that maybe another person didn't even notice. This is one reason it's so great to read and discuss the Word in a group.



The passage from the Bible we will read today is 2 Corinthians 9:6–15. It teaches us about generosity, which is when we share what we have with others, even if we don't have to.

In this story we are taught a couple of things about having a heart for giving.

The first is that when we give with all our heart, God loves to return the blessing back on us. In Luke 6:38 Jesus said, "Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full—pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into your lap. The amount you give will determine the amount you get back." We can give our money, time, and energy, trusting that God will provide everything we need. But He doesn't stop there! He goes above and beyond to bless us. He is a good Father!

The second truth from this passage is that when we give and serve with a generous heart, other people's needs will be met, and God will be glorified. This is what our whole life should be about—giving glory to God and making His name known! In 1 Corinthians 10:31 it says, "So whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." Cheerfully giving our time, energy, and even money to serve others brings glory to God. This is what it looks like to live with a heart of compassion!

Welcome each girl by name (show friendship and warmth). Greet families as they drop their girls off and thank them for coming to church. Share your excitement by saying something such as, "You could be anywhere, and you came here to church. Choosing to be in God's house is always a great choice." Ask the girl a relationship-building question. Some examples include:

- What was your high/low this week? •
- Tell me about the best thing that happened this week! •
- What was a challenge you've overcome? ٠
- Was there anything cool you saw God do this week? •

Take notes discreetly (or at the end of the small group time) about each girl and follow up in subsequent weeks to show them you care about what they care about.

ACTIVITY CENTERS (20–30 minutes)

As girls arrive, provide one center activity for every 4 or 5 girls: play dough, LEGO[®] bricks, Wikki Stix[®], connecting beads, a craft, board games, coloring, etc.

Intentionally make this a relational time. The goal is to build relationships with girls as they are engaged in an activity and with families as they drop their girls off.

CENTERS + CHECK OUT TIME (20-30 minutes)

As girls are being picked up, provide one center activity for every 4 or 5 girls: play dough, LEGO® bricks, Wikki Stix®, connecting beads, a craft, board games, coloring, etc.

Continue to intentionally make this a relational time. Be intentional with continuing conversations about the lesson and even working on Scripture memorization.

Notice each girl as she is leaving and use her name as you say goodbye. Invite her back next time. Be sure each girl knows you are looking forward to seeing her again soon!

AFTER THE LESSON

ENGAGE (15–20 minutes)

Have a Compassion Celebration!

Decorations for the room: posters from all four Compassion lessons, streamers, tablecloths, etc., snacks (chips and dip, cookies and milk, popcorn bar, etc.); **Reflection Page, Key Truth/Scripture Poster, 1** per girl; pens/pencils



Decorate the room and have snacks prepared, print the **Reflection Page** and **Key Truth/Scripture Poster**, and have fun worship music ready to play.

As a culminating activity, start by having a celebration to acknowledge all the ways the girls have grown and things they have learned through this unit! While the girls are eating, play some fun worship music and have them think about ways the Lord has used them to show compassion using the Reflection Page. They can journal or doodle, however they are best able to reflect. After about 10 minutes, girls can share what they reflected on. Sharing as a group or partner sharing are both great ways to do this! After each girl shares, verbally give praise to the Lord ("Thank You, Jesus, for using us to show compassion to the people who You love so much!").



How did the person feel when you showed compassion in that way?

How did it make you feel to be used by God to show compassion?



Our Key Truth today is: "I celebrate how God used me to show compassion." Let's say that together, "I celebrate how God used me to show compassion." Let's also say our Memory Verse from Psalm 145:8 together: "The LORD is merciful and compassionate, slow to get angry, and filled with unfailing love." Today's Key Truth leads us to Psalm 145:9 (NIV), which says,

The LORD is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made.



Hold up a sample and hand out a **Key Truth/Scripture Poster** to each girl.





Psalm 66:1–2 says, "Shout joyful praises to God, all the earth! Sing about the glory of his name! Tell the world how glorious he is." It's important that we take time to give thanks to God. He is so good to us all the time and loves us so much.

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The fact that we get to be a part of *His* plan to show compassion to others is such an honor. For this reason, we will celebrate!

EXPLORE (10–15 minutes)

Make a Compassion Chain

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Paper strips, 2x12 inches, 2 or 3 per girl; tape/stapler; scissors or paper cutter

Cut the paper strips.

This activity will encourage girls to think of all the ways they could show compassion to others. When the chain is completed, it can be used as a classroom decoration and reminder to celebrate how God has used them to show compassion.



Instructions

Brainstorm ways to show compassion to others. It might help if you put these questions on the board:

- What is something you could do for someone who has had a bad day? •
- ٠ How could you care for someone who is struggling?
- How could you show compassion without giving someone something? •

Girls will write their ideas on a paper strip, one idea per strip. Feel free to have the girls share their ideas with the group. After each girl has filled two or three paper strips with their ideas of how they can show compassion, they will bring their strips to the mentor. The mentor will staple or tape the strips into rings to form a paper chain. This process will continue until all strips have been connected. You can use the paper chain as a visual display in the classroom, reminding the girls to celebrate how God can use them to show compassion.



When you see this chain, my hope is that you girls would be reminded that there are so many ways we can show compassion every day. And when we live our lives with this kind of love, we are bringing glory to the Lord!

EXPLAIN (20–25 minutes)

Read the Bible Story (Matthew 14:13–21)

Print the **Bible Story**.

Bible Literacy Strategy

Read through the text with your group at least two times. On the first time through, read it like normal. Then, on the second read-through, model using highlighters / pens / colored pencils to mark things that stand out. Explain to girls that they could mark things they want to remember or put a question mark next to things that don't make sense. Show them how they can even write notes in the margins if the Lord puts something on their heart as they read. Let them know there's no right or wrong way to do this. What one girl chooses to highlight will probably be different from what another girl highlights. That's okay, and it's actually a good thing! As we mark the things that are meaningful to us and discuss it with others, someone may share something that maybe another person didn't even notice! This is one reason it's so great to read and discuss the Word in a group.

Bible Story, 1 per girl, highlighters / pens / colored pencils



Right before this story, Jesus received word that His relative and close friend, John the Baptist, had been killed. This news would have been heartbreaking for Jesus. Let's read to see what happened next.

Teaching Tip

Try "popcorn reading" to increase engagement! This is when girls voluntarily take turns reading a few verses at a time. You could ask one girl to start with a few verses. She quickly stands up, reads her verses, and then calls on another girl whose hand is raised to continue reading the next few verses, and so on. This process is continued until the passage has been read.

much as they wanted, and afterward, the **disciples** picked up twelve baskets of leftovers. **21** About 5,000 men were fed that day, in addition to all the women and children!



Let's reread verses 13–14 (read as a group). Imagine how Jesus must have felt. He had just found out that someone incredibly special to Him had been killed. He needed some time alone to deal with His deep sadness. But the crowds of people followed Him. If I were in that situation, helping other people would be the last thing I would feel up to doing. But not Jesus. Like it says in Psalm 145:9 (NIV), "The LORD is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made." Despite His own personal sorrows and exhaustion, Jesus saw the needs of those around Him and healed their sick.



How do you think this act of compassion made the people feel?

Think about a time when someone was compassionate and generous toward you. How did that make you feel?



Jesus is the ultimate example of compassion. If we look at the rest of the story, His heart of compassion continued to shine through. It was getting dark and there was no food for the people. Jesus could have very well encouraged the people to go back home and get some food. Instead, He insisted the disciples feed the people! He recognized the people had a need and wanted to bless them. He didn't make excuses. He showed His great love when He gave thanks to God for what they had and believed in faith that it would be enough to bless each person. And it was. Not only that, but there were more leftovers than what they started with!



What does all of this tell you about the heart of Jesus?

How can we live with a heart of compassion like this?
